CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: THE MEETING WILL COME TO ORDER. PERHAPS WE SHOULD HAVE THE ROLL CALL OF BOARD MEMBERS.

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: WE WILL STAND AND HAVE A PLEDGE OF

ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG.

(PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE)

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: THIS MEETING IS A SPECIAL CALLED MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA
RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT, AND IS A PUBLIC HEARING TO RECEIVE THE
OPINIONS OF INTERESTED PERSONS ON THE SUBJECT OF POSSIBLE
MODIFICATIONS OF SENIOR CITIZENS FARES.

PRESENT WHO HAVE STATEMENTS TO MAKE, WE WILL HAVE A STATEMENT BY THE GENERAL MANAGER, INDICATING OR GIVING THE PRESENT STRUCTURE AND SOME HISTORY CONCERNING THE SENIOR CITIZENS FARES.

MR. JACK R. GILSTRAP: THANK YOU MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD AND LADIES AND GENTLEMEN.

THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT
HAS BEEN ASSIGNED TWO IMPORTANT RESPONSIBILITIES BY THE STATE
LEGISLATURE. THEY ARE TO OPERATE SUFFICIENT BUS TRANSPORTATION
AND TO PLAN, CONSTRUCT, AND OPERATE A TRUE MASS RAPID TRANSIT
SYSTEM.

A KEY ELEMENT IN BOTH OF THESE VITAL PROGRAMS

IS THE RESPONSIBLE ALLOCATION OF AVAILABLE FUNDS. WITH THIS IN

MIND, IT SHOULD BE NOTED THAT REVENUES FROM THE FARE BOX

REPRESENT THE SINGLE LARGEST SOURCE OF INCOME TO THE DISTRICT

AND, IN TURN, SENIOR CITIZEN FARES ARE AN IMPORTANT ASPECT

TO CONSIDER WITH RESPECT TO THE TASKS AT HAND.

I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE YOU A BRIEF HISTORY OF
SENIOR CITIZEN REDUCED FARES IN OUR AREA. THE LOS ANGELES
METROPOLITAN TRANSIT AUTHORITY, OUR PREDECESSOR, WAS ONE OF
THE FRONT-RUNNERS IN THE NATION TO RECOGNIZE THE PUBLIC TRANSIT
NEEDS OF SENIOR CITIZENS. REDUCED FARES WERE OFFERED BY THE

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MTA BEGINNING IN JUNE OF 1961, AND I MIGHT SAY THAT THAT ACTION WAS TAKEN WITH THE STRONG SUPPORT AND URGING OF YOUR BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

IN JULY OF 1967 THE BASIC FARE FOR ALL DISTRICT PASSENGERS WAS RAISED FROM 25 CENTS TO 30 CENTS, WHERE IT REMAINS TODAY. HOWEVER, THE SENIOR CITIZEN FARE AT THAT TIME WAS NOT INCREASED BUT REMAINED AT 20 CENTS. THIS MEANS THAT SENIOR CITIZENS TODAY ARE OFFERED MORE THAN A 30 PERCENT REDUCTION OFF TODAY'S REGULAR FARE.

IN JULY OF 1967 THE DISTRICT INTRODUCED MONTHLY PASSES FOR ALL PASSENGERS. A REGULAR PASS SELLS FOR \$12 AND A SENIOR CITIZEN PASS FOR \$9. THE MONTHLY PASS IS GOOD FOR UNRESTRICTED HOURS OF RIDING, WHEREAS THE REDUCED CASH FARE IS GOOD BETWEEN 9:00 A.M. AND 3:00 P.M. AND AFTER 7:00 P.M. MONDAY THROUGH SATURDAY. THERE IS NO RESTRICTION ON SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

OF THE 16 MAJOR TRANSIT AGENCIES IN THE COUNTRY OFFERING REDUCED FARES, THE RATE OFFERED BY YOUR RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT PLACES US ROUGHLY IN THE CENTER OF THAT GROUP. THE SENIOR CITIZEN FARES IN LOS ANGELES ARE AVAILABLE TO A PASSENGER WHO SHOWS A LOS ANGELES COUNTY SENIOR CITIZEN ID CARD WHEN BOARDING. THE SENIOR CITIZEN ID CARD IS ISSUED BY THE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF SENIOR CITIZEN AFFAIRS. IT IS ISSUED AT NO CHARGE TO WOMEN 61 OR OLDER AND MEN 65 OR OLDER. THE ONLY OTHER REQUIREMENT IS THAT EARNINGS DO NOT EXCEED THE AMOUNT ALLOWED BY SOCIAL SECURITY REGULATIONS. THIS IS THE AMOUNT EARNED OVER AND ABOVE YOUR RETIREMENT INCOME AND IS CURRENTLY SET AT \$1,680 FOR SINGLE PERSONS AND \$3,360 FOR

A MARRIED COUPLE PER YEAR.

YEAR THE ID CARD HAD TO HAVE A PHOTOGRAPH OF THE USER ATTACHED, AND WITH THAT REQUIREMENT BETWEEN 400 AND 500 CARDS WERE ISSUED EACH MONTH. SINCE THE ELIMINATION OF THE PHOTO REQUIREMENT, THE COUNTY HAS BEEN ISSUING AN AVERAGE OF 1300 ID CARDS PER MONTH. WE BELIEVE THE REASON FOR THE INCREASE IS THAT IN COOPERATION WITH YOUR COUNTY WE HAVE MADE IT EASIER TO GET AN ID CARD, AND THE QUALIFICATIONS ARE MORE CLEARLY STATED. WE HAVE ALSO MADE IT EASIER TO GET A SENIOR CITIZEN'S MONTHLY PASS. WE NOW SELL BETTER THAN 5,000 SENIOR CITIZEN PASSES PER MONTH AND THE COUNTY TELLS US THAT THE PRIMARY REASON FOR THE 90,000 SENIOR CITIZEN ID CARDS IN USE TODAY IS THE REDUCED RATES FOR TRANSPORTATION OFFERED BY THE RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT.

WITH THIS BRIEF HISTORY, MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS,
TODAY I KNOW THAT YOU ARE ANXIOUS AND WE ARE, TOO, TO OBTAIN
CONSTRUCTIVE SUGGESTIONS OF INDIVIDUALS AND GROUPS FROM THE
COMMUNITY WE SERVE CONCERNING THIS IMPORTANT MATTER OF SENIOR
CITIZEN FARES.

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: THANK YOU, MR. GILSTRAP.

NEXT WE'LL HAVE A STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY, WHICH WOULD INDICATE THAT THIS MEETING IS PROPERLY CONVENED.

SECRETARY REES: I HAVE IN MY POSSESSION AFFIDAVITS

OF PUBLICATION FROM LA OPINION, LOS ANGELES HERALD, AND LOS

ANGELES TIMES SHOWING PUBLICATION OF THIS NOTICE OF THIS

MEETING ON APRIL 3RD AND ALSO THE LOS ANGELES SENTINEL SHOWING

PUBLICATION ON APRIL 6TH.

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU.

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THE TRANSIT DISTRICT IS THE GUEST TODAY OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IN THAT WE ARE MEETING IN THESE RATHER SPACIOUS QUARTERS AND COMPARED TO OUR NORMAL MEETING ROOM, THIS IS LIKE BEING IN THE WALDORF, I GUESS.

BUT A MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IS HERE.

HE HAS INDICATED THAT BEFORE HE MAKES ANY REMARKS CONCERNING

THE ISSUE WHICH WE ARE CONFRONTED WITH TODAY, HE WOULD LIKE

TO WELCOME YOU TO THE BOARD CHAMBERS.

MR. HAHN, SUPERVISOR OF THE 2ND SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT.

(APPLAUSE)

SUPERVISOR KENNETH HAHN: MR. VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE DISTRICT, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT, WE ARE DELIGHTED THAT YOU ARE HERE TODAY AND WE ARE DELIGHTED THAT YOU ARE USING THIS ROOM.

WE HAVE HAD MANY KINDS OF HEARINGS HERE FROM

TAXES TO AIR POLLUTION TO RAPID TRANSIT TO HEALTH PROBLEMS,

BUT I THINK THIS COULD BE A VERY SIGNIFICANT MEETING AND I AM

VERY PLEASED TO SEE THE LARGE GATHERING HERE.

WELCOME. THANK YOU.

SHOULD I GIVE YOU MY FEELINGS OF THIS PROBLEM NOW OR LATER?

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: YES. I THINK BEFORE WE START I
MIGHT INDICATE THAT WE WILL MAKE AN EFFORT TO HEAR EVERYONE
WHO HAS SOMETHING TO SAY CONCERNING THE ISSUE BEFORE US. ON
THE SHEET ON WHICH THOSE OF YOU WHO DESIRE TO SPEAK INDICATED
THAT YOU WANTED TO SPEAK, WE DIDN'T ASK IF THERE WAS ANYONE

 IN OPPOSITION AND WHETHER THERE WOULD BE ANY OPPOSITION. AT SOME POINT I WILL DETERMINE THOSE WHO WANT TO SPEAK IN FAVOR AND THOSE - IF THERE ARE ANY HERE - WHO WOULD WANT TO SPEAK AGAINST THE PROPOSITION, AND WE WILL HAVE SOME LIMITATION ON TIME. IT WILL DEPEND ON THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE. WE HAVE HAD A PROPER CANVASS OF ALL OF THOSE WHO DESIRE TO SPEAK. AS SOON AS I HAVE THAT INFORMATION WE WILL BE ABLE TO INDICATE THE APPROXIMATE TIME THAT EACH PERSON WOULD HAVE, IF THEY DESIRE.

AND WITH THAT, WE'LL START OFF WITH MR. HAHN.
YOU WILL GIVE US YOUR COMMENTS.

SUPERVISOR HAHN: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN.

FIRST OF ALL, I'D LIKE TO PRESENT FOR THE RECORD

A PETITION THAT WAS GIVEN TO ME THIS ADRNING IN MY OFFICE,

EITHER SENT IN OR BROUGHT IN, OF 403 SIGNATURES URGING A

REDUCED FARE FOR SENIOR CITIZENS. AND AS I JUST LOOK THROUGH

THIS PETITION, THERE IS EVERY SECTION OF THE COUNTY AND EVERY

SECTION OF THE CITY, THE ADDRESSES ON IT. I DON'T SEE ONE

OF THEM FROM MY DISTRICT, SO THERE ARE NO VOTES FOR ME ON

THIS ONE. (LAUGHTER)

BUT IT'S A PETITION.

MISS VIRGINIA REES, WOULD YOU ACCEPT THIS AS PART OF THE RECORD.

(THE DOCUMENT WAS HANDED TO SECRETARY REES AND BECAME A PART OF THE RECORD.)

SUPERVISOR HAHN: MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

AND MR. CHAIRMAN, IT IS MY BELIEF, AND I BELIEVE I'VE INTRO
DUCED FOUR RESOLUTIONS FOR THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS REQUESTING

THE RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT TO REDUCE THE FARES FOR SENIOR

CITIZENS MAINLY BECAUSE I THINK IT'S RIGHT AND FAIR. THAT'S
HOW SIMPLE THE REQUEST IS. I THINK IT WILL INCREASE REVENUES
FOR THE DISTRICT. I DO NOT BUY THE ARGUMENT THAT IT'S GOING
TO COST \$512,000 AND OTHER PEOPLE WILL HAVE TO RAISE THEIR
RATES BECAUSE WE ARE GOING TO GIVE REDUCED FARES TO SENIOR
CITIZENS. I THINK IT WILL INCREASE REVENUES FOR THE DISTRICT.
I HAVE SEEN SO MANY TIMES THE RAPID TRANSIT BUSES OPERATING
HALF EMPTY, IN SOME CASES THREE-QUARTERS EMPTY AND SOMETIMES
ON SUNDAY 95 PERCENT EMPTY, AND IF YOU HAD A DIME THERE THAT
WOULD BE ALL NEW REVENUE.

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SO I LOOK AT IT AS A REVENUE MEASURE. I DON'T THINK IT WILL COST THE DISTRICT ANYTHING. IT'LL ADD TO THE DISTRICT. IT WILL ALSO GIVE TO THE SENIOR CITIZENS GOOD PUBLIC SERVICE, IT WILL STRENGTHEN OUR COMMUNITY, AND IT WILL GIVE THE SENIOR CITIZENS A FEELING TO TRAVEL WHEREVER THEY WANT TO FOR A DIME WITH NO TRANSFER FARE (APPLAUSE), AND FEEL THAT "THIS IS MY SYSTEM. I OWN IT. I'M AN AMERICAN CITIZEN. I'VE LIVED HERE A LONG TIME. I HAVE BUILT THIS COUNTY. I HAVE BUILT THE SYSTEM." IN FACT, THEY PROBABLY ARE SAYING, "I WISH YOU'D LEAVE THE RED CAR LINES ON, THAT WE USED TO RIDE ON FOR A DIME." THAT'S WHAT THEY'RE PROBABLY SAYING (APPLAUSE) AND I'D LIKE TO JUST ASK THE AUDIENCE HOW MANY OF THEM REMEMBER THE OLD RED CAR LINE? WELL, SAY NO MORE. I USED TO RIDE THEM MYSELF. I REMEMBER WHEN YOU COULD RIDE THE OLD YELLOW CARS FOR A NICKEL AND THEN SEVEN CENTS, THEN FOUR TOKENS FOR A QUARTER. DO ANY OF YOU REMEMBER THOSE FOUR -- OH, WELL, I WAS BORN HERE. I USED TO JUMP ON THEM FREE, TOO. THAT WAS ILLEGAL, BUT I DID IT.

NOW, MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, SOME OF YOU ARE OLD-TIMERS HERE, SOME OF YOU HAVE BEEN HERE AS LONG AS I HAVE, MAYBE LONGER (LAUGHTER), AND YOU REMEMBER THESE SYSTEMS. YOU REMEMBER THE RED CAR LINES AND THE STREETCAR TRACKS, AND ONE BY ONE THEY WERE ABANDONED, AND THEN THE SYSTEM DEVELOPED HERE, I GUESS IN EVERY PUBLIC COMMUNITY, WHERE, AS THE FARES WENT UP, THE PATRONS WENT DOWN, AND IT BECAME A MONSTER. AND THEN LINES WERE ELIMINATED, AND THE FIRST THING YOU KNOW, WE HAVE CHAOS IN PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION.

I THINK THAT 10-CENT FARE, FRANKLY, I DON'T -SOME CITIES ARE GIVING FREE FARES. (APPLAUSE) I UNDERSTAND
LONG BEACH HAS PASSED SOME KIND OF MOTION, MR. NEWCOMB, TO
SAY THAT THEY ARE STARTING TO GIVE SENIOR CITIZENS FREE FARE
IN LONG BEACH. I DON'T KNOW IF THAT'S TRUE OR NOT, BUT I WAS
TOLD THAT.

CHAIR MAN NEUSOM: WE MAY HAVE TO CALL MR. NEWCOMB AS A WITNESS.

SUPER/ISOR HAHN: IS THAT TRUE, MR. NEWCOMB? HAVE YOU HEARD THAT ---

MR. NEWCOMB: BEG PARDON.

SUPERVISOR HAHN: HAVE YOU HEARD THAT, THAT --

MR. NEWCOMB: NO, I HAVEN'T.

SUPERVISOR HAHN: -- LONG BEACH IS STARTING TO? I HEARD THAT THIS MORNING.

I FEEL THIS, THAT MANY OF OUR SENIOR CITIZENS

COULD VISIT THEIR GRANDCHILDREN, AND IF FOR NOTHING MORE THAN

JUST BE BABY-SITTERS FOR THEIR GRANDCHILDREN WHILE THEIR

22 .

CHILDREN, THEIR OWN CHILDREN, GO SHOPPING OR VISITING.

I SAY THAT MANY OF OUR SENIOR CITIZENS GO FROM ONE END OF THE COUNTY TO THE OTHER, TO THEIR OWN DOCTOR, TO THEIR OWN HOSPITALS. I THINK THEY GO TO THEIR OWN MEETING PLACES. THEY COULD ENJOY LIFE MORE. AND I DON'T SEE WHY THIS SYSTEM OF A 10-CENT FARE NEEDS TO HAVE ALL THE PROCLAMATIONS AND RESOLUTIONS TO URGE THE DISTRICT TO DO IT.

I CANNOT HELP BUT NOTICE HERE - AND I'M ABOUT THROUGH - HOW QUICKLY, HOW QUICKLY THE DOWNTOWN BUSINESSMEN THROUGH THE CENTRAL DISTRICT GOT \$750,000, OR \$725,000, FOR THE MINIBUSES DOWNTOWN TO SERVE THE MUSIC CENTER AND THE CENTRAL DISTRICT. AND THAT'S ONLY 10 CENTS. THEY BOUGHT BRAND NEW EQUIPMENT, PUT ON NEW ROUTES FOR 10 CENTS FOR THE MERCHANTS DOWNTOWN TO HAVE THEM TRAVEL DOWNTOWN. BUT THE PEOPLE WHO LIVE OUT IN THE COMMUNITY, THEY WERE PRETTY WELL FORGOTTEN ON A 10-CENT FARE, AND I THINK A 10-CENT FARE WILL STIMULATE BUSINESS AND TRADE AND FRIENDSHIP AND PROMOTE GOODWILL, AND IT'S THE BEST PUBLIC RELATIONS THAT I KNOW OF FOR THE TRANSIT DISTRICT. I DON'T KNOW OF A BETTER ONE THAN TO SAY, "LISTEN, THIS IS YOUR SYSTEM. WE WANT YOU TO USE IT WHEN IT'S NOT BUSY. WE'RE NOT GOING ON A DOG-IN-THE-MANGER ATTITUDE; THE BUSES ARE RUNNING EMPTY, THEY'RE RUNNING HALF. LET'S USE THEM. LET'S MAKE THE PEOPLE HAPPY AND LET'S DO IT AS QUICK AS WE CAN."

(APPLAUSE)

ANY QUESTIONS?

MR. MC MILLAN: KENNY, I'D LIKE TO ASK YOU -SUPERVISOR HAHN: MR. MC MILLAN HERE.

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MR. MC MILLAN: -- WHERE WERE YOU WHEN THE 2 1/2-CENT 1 FARE WAS ON FOR BOYS TO RIDE? 2 SUPERVISOR HAHN: 2 1/2-CENT FARE? 3 MR. MC MILLAN: 2 1/2-CENT FARE. 4 SUPERVISOR HAHN: I WAS BORN IN 1920, SO I DON'T 5 REMEMBER THAT. (LAUGHTER) 6 DID YOU RIDE FOR 2 CENTS? 7 MR. MC MILLAN: 2 1/2. 8 SUPERVISOR HAHN: A PRESIDENT OF THE GOLD STAR MOTHERS 9 WHO IS SITTING HERE ON THE FRONT ROW TOLD ME THIS MORNING -10 SHE CAME FROM LONG BEACH, A GROUP OF GOLD STAR MOTHERS HERE -11 BUT SHE'S NOT GOING TO SPEAK, SHE SAID; SHE'S JUST HERE TO 12 13 WATCH. SHE SAID THAT SHE HEARD THAT SOMEWHERE UP IN PORTLAND OR SAN FRANCISCO OR SOMEWHERE WHERE THEY --14 15 MRS. OLIVE HESSLING: SAN FRANCISCO, AND IT WAS 5 CENTS ON FRIDAY, AND SATURDAY IT'S NOTHING. 16 17 SUPERVISOR HAHN: SHE TOLD ME THAT IT WAS 5 CENTS IN SAN FRANCISCO ON FRIDAY. AND SATURDAY --18 MRS. HESSLING: 5 CENTS ON FRIDAY. AND SACRAMENTO ON 19 20 FRIDAY AND SATURDAY IT'S FREE. 21 SUPERVISOR HAHN: FREE. SO YOU SEE YOU ARE HAVING PEOPLE FROM --22 MRS. HESSLING: I JUST WAS UP THERE AT THE NATIONAL 23 24 CONVENTION. I WAS JUST UP THERE AND KNOW THAT IT WAS THE 25 TRUTH. 26 SUPERVISOR HAHN: SHE SAID SHE WASN'T GOING TO TESTIFY, 27 BUT SHE'S DONE A GOOD JOB OF IT ALREADY.

. (APPLAUSE)

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: ALL RIGHT.

SUPERVISOR HAHN: THEY CAME UP HERE AND SAID THEY'RE ONLY FOR A NICKEL OR A PENNY, AND I THINK THEY ARE FROM LONG BEACH, THE GOLD STAR MOTHERS. THEY HAVE A LARGE HOME DOWN THERE.

DOWN THEKE

IT'S A PLEASURE TO HAVE YOU APPEARING.

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SUPERVISOR HAHN: AND I WANT TO CONGRATULATE THE DISTRICT ON ONE SIDE NOW ON YOUR VISION - NOTHING TO DO WITH THE 10-CENT FARE NOW - ON YOUR VISION TO GO AHEAD ON RAPID TRANSIT. I LIKE YOUR BOLD ACTION. I THINK YOU'VE GOT TO MOVE FORWARD ON THAT, THE TIMING IS NOW. I HOPE YOU DON'T USE ANY METHOD TO DELAY OUR BUILDING THIS RAPID TRANSIT BY MORE STUDIES.

I THINK WE'VE HAD STUDIES ENOUGH, BUT I LIKE WHAT YOU'RE DOING FOR GOING AHEAD. NOW'S THE TIME FOR ACTION.

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MR. SUPERVISOR.

THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

(APPLAUSE)

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: NEXT I WOULD LIKE TO CALL ON MR. JOHN CARL BROGDON, WHO IS MAYOR PRO TEM OF THE CITY OF CULVER CITY.

MR. JOHN CARL BROGDON: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMISSION.

I'D JUST LIKE TO SAY THAT I AM NO LATE CONVERT
TO THE PLIGHT OF THE SENIOR CITIZENS NOR AM I A LATE CONVERT
AS AN EXPONENT OF SENIOR POWER.

WHILE I AM THE YOUNGEST MEMBER OF THE CULVER
CITY COUNCIL, I AM THE MOST VOCIFEROUS EXPONENT THERE OF THE
NEEDS OF THE SENIOR CITIZENS. WE RECENTLY BUILT A NEW SENIOR

CITIZENS CENTER AND ON MY MOTION WE EXEMPTED THE SENIOR CITIZENS
OF OUR COMMUNITY FROM THE IMPOSITION OF THE UTILITY USER'S TAX,
WHICH IS A SURCHARGE ON UTILITY BILLS. THIS IS THE FIRST TIME
THAT THIS HAD BEEN DONE IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA. WE WERE
THE FIRST CHARTER CITY TO TAKE THIS STEP. SINCE THAT TIME A
NUMBER OF OTHER CHARTER CITIES HAVE EMULATED US.

I WOULD SUPPORT SUPERVISOR HAHN'S MOTION PROPOSAL, RATHER, FOR A 10-CENT FARE, EXCEPT THAT I WOULD MUCH
RATHER SEE IT A FREE FARE.

(APPLAUSE)

I WOULD RESPECTIVELY SUBMIT THAT IT IS PENNYWISE

AND POUND FOOLISH TO EXPECT SENIOR CITIZENS TO PAY AT THE FARE

BOX FOR THE COST OF THEIR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION.

I SUBMIT THAT THERE ARE INVISIBLE ITEMS OF COMPENSATION. THE MORE SENIOR CITIZENS IN THE MORE CITIZENS GENERAL THAT USE THE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION, THE FEWER ROADWAYS, THE FEWER CARS ON THE ROAD, THE FEWER FUMES IN OUR ATMOSPHERE.

I WOULD URGE, THEN, THAT YOU SUPPORT THE CONCEPT
OF FREE BUS FARES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS THROUGH NONPEAK HOURS.

I WOULD MAKE ONE POINT. AS COMMISSIONER HAYWARD KNOWS AND
PERHAPS SOME OF THE OTHERS, CULVER CITY IS ONE OF THE FEW
CHARTER CITIES IN THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA AREA THAT HAS ITS
OWN BUS LINE. SINCE I URGE YOU TO ADOPT FREE FARES, IT'S
APPROPRIATE TO ASK ME WHAT CULVER CITY HAS DONE IN THIS AREA.
I REGRET TO SAY THAT AT THIS POINT I HAVE BEEN UNABLE TO
PERSUADE MY COLLEAGUES TO ADOPT THIS PROPOSAL. HOWEVER, IT
IS UNDER STUDY, AND I WOULD SUBMIT THAT IF YOU ADOPT IT, WITHIN
A FORTNIGHT I CAN ASSURE YOU THAT THE CULVER CITY MUNICIPAL

BUS LINE WILL ALSO HAVE A LIKE POLICY. YOU ARE THE GIANT. 1 YOU ARE THE PACE-SETTER. INEVITABLY WHEN SUCH A PROPOSAL IS 2 MADE, THE QUESTION IS, WHAT IS RTD DOING OR WHAT IS L.A. 3 DOING? I URGE YOU THEN TO MOVE FORWARD EXPEDITIOUSLY IN THIS 5 MATTER SO THAT THOSE OF US IN THE SMALLER CITIES WHO NEED 6 YOUR SUPPORT CAN ACCOMPLISH THE FREE FARES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS. 7 THANK YOU. 8 (APPLAUSE) CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: MR. KOJIMA, FIELD REPRESENTATIVE REPRESENTING TOM BRADLEY, COUNCILMAN, 10TH DISTRICT. 10 MR. MASAMORI KOJIMA: MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE 11 BOARD, THANK YOU FOR THIS OPPORTUNITY. MR. BRADLEY IS BUSY 12 13 IN COUNCIL, BUT HE ASKED ME TO READ THIS SHORT STATEMENT TO 14 YOU. 15 COUNCILMAN BRADLEY SAYS THAT WE OWE OUR SENIOR CITIZENS FULL RESPECT, DIGNITY, AND COMFORT. THAT GOES 17 WITHOUT SAYING, OF COURSE. BUT IN SO MANY WAYS, SENIOR 18 CITIZENS FEEL THAT THEY ARE OVERLOOKED BY SOCIETY - INDEED, 19 NEGLECTED AND CAST ASIDE. 20 NOW, I THINK WE HAVE A WAY TO DO SOMETHING FOR 21 THEM IN THE MATTER OF BUS RIDES. 22 THE BUSES RUN TO SCHEDULE, AND IN THE OFF HOURS, 23 THERE MUST LITERALLY BE THOUSANDS OF EMPTY SEATS. 24 WHY NOT GIVE THESE TO OUR SENIOR CITIZENS FREE. 25 (APPLAUSE) 26 OTHER CITES ARE ALREADY DOING SOMETHING FOR 27

SENIOR CITIZENS IN BUS FARES. THEY HAVE REDUCED THEM.

BUT WHY DON'T WE FOLLOW THE LOGIC OF UNUSED

SEATS IN THE OFF HOURS. PUT THESE TO USE BY GIVING THEM TO OUR SENIOR CITIZENS.

FOR ALL THAT SENIOR CITIZENS HAVE GIVEN OF THEIR LIVES ENRICHING THIS SOCIETY, THIS IS A SMALL MEASURE OF OUR APPRECIATION. THEY DESERVE THIS.

I SAY: FREE RIDES FOR OUR SENIOR CITIZENS.
THANK YOU.

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: THANK YOU.

NEXT, MR. JOE VELNA, SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO LOS ANGELES CITY COUNCILMAN GILBERT W. LINDSAY, 9TH DISTRICT.

MR. JOE VELNA: LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, AUDIENCE MEMBERS, COUNCILMAN LINDSAY HAD HOPED TO APPEAR HERE THIS MORNING, BUT UNFORTUNATELY COULDN'T." HE ASKED ME TO COME HERE AND MAKE A PERSONAL APPEAL IN HIS BEHALF THAT YOU EXTEND ANY COURTESIES POSSIBLE TO THE SENIOR CITIZENS OF THE LOS ANGELES BASIN AND ALSO HE ASKED THAT YOU MIGHT CONSIDER EXTENDING SOME COURTESY TO THE GREAT MANY UNEMPLOYED PEOPLE OF LOS ANGELES AND THE WELFARE RECIPIENTS WHO ARE ALSO ON LIMITED INCOME AND MUST SEEK JOBS ON THE FEW PENNIES THEY HAVE.

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: THANK YOU.

(APPLAUSE)

MR. ROBERT G. MEDINA, DIRECTOR, COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, DEPARTMENT OF SENIOR CITIZEN AFFAIRS.

(APPLAUSE)

MR. ROBERT G. MEDINA: MR. NEUSOM, CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

. A MAJOR CONDITION THAT AFFECTS THE ELDERLY IN

OUR COMMUNITY IS THEIR ISOLATION FROM SOCIETY'S MAINSTREAM.

THIS ISOLATION IMPINGES ON THEIR LIFE STYLE TO A

DEGREE WHERE NORMAL NEEDS, SUCH AS SHOPPING FOR FOOD AND OTHER

NECESSITIES; A VISIT TO THE DOCTOR; INVOLVEMENT IN SOCIAL,

CULTURAL, AND RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES, BECOME DIFFICULT AND

OFTEN IMPOSSIBLE TO ACHIEVE.

TRANSPORTATION SERVICES, ALONG WITH OTHER MAJOR CONCERNS FACING OUR ELDERLY, IS A KEY ISSUE THAT NEEDS TO BE WORKED ON IN ORDER TO MINIMIZE THIS ISOLATION.

THE WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON AGING IN DECEMBER

1971 IDENTIFIED TRANSPORTATION AS ONE OF THE MAJOR AREAS OF

CONCERN FOR THE NATION'S ELDERLY, AND RECOMMENDS THAT THE

NATION GIVE THIS AREA A HIGH PRIORITY.

THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY
HAS GONE ON RECORD AS SUPPORTING MODIFICATION OF SENIOR
CITIZENS' FARES ON THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA RAPID TRANSIT SYS—
TEM. AS A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE COUNTY AGENCY UNDER THE
BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, THE DEPARTMENT OF SENIOR CITIZENS AFFAIRS,
WHICH HAS AS ONE OF ITS MAIN FUNCTIONS TO BE AN ADVOCATE FOR
THE ELDERLY OF OUR COUNTY, I, AS A DIRECTOR OF THAT AGENCY,
STRONGLY URGE THAT THIS LEADERSHIP TAKEN BY THE BOARD RECEIVE
THE UTMOST SUPPORT IN SUPPORTING THIS REDUCED FARES FOR OUR
SENIOR CITIZENS.

THIS KIND OF ACTION ON THE PART OF OUR LEADERS

OF OUR COMMUNITY WILL ENHANCE THE WELL-BEING OF OUR OLDEST

CITIZENS WHO HAVE GIVEN MANY YEARS OF THEIR LABOR, SERVICE,

AND TAXES TO THIS COUNTY.

(APPLAUSE)

MR. JAMES CARBRAY, CHAIRMAN, SENIOR CITIZENS ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE, L.A. COUNTY FEDERATION OF LABOR.

(APPLAUSE)

MR. JAMES CARBRAY: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN.

MY NAME IS JIM CARBRAY, 10766 HOMELAND AVENUE, WHITTIER.

I SUPPOSE YOU COULD SAY I AM WEARING TWO HATS,
REPRESENTING THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY FEDERATION OF LABOR AS
CHAIRMAN OF ITS SENIOR CITIZENS ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE, AND
SECONDLY, AS A MEMBER OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE 3,000,000MEMBER NATIONAL COUNCIL OF SENIOR CITIZENS.

MAY I EXPRESS THE APPRECIATION OF THOSE SENIORS
WHO PRESENTLY ENJOY THE PREVAILING REDUCTION IN RATES WITHIN
ITS RESTRICTED LIMITS, BUT I MUST ADD IF WE COMPARE THESE
MODIFIED RATES WITH THOSE IN OTHER METROPOLITAN AREAS, WE
MUST ADMIT THERE IS PRECEDENT, JUSTIFICATION, AND A SIGNIFICANT
MORAL OBLIGATION FOR US TO EFFECTUATE A MORE REALISTIC LEVEL
OF FARES FOR THE ELDERLY.

NOW LET'S CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING SCHEDULE OF FARES FOR SENIORS NOW PREVALENT IN SOME MAJOR AREAS.

SAN FRANCISCO: THE PREVAILING RATE FOR REGULAR SCHEDULES ARE 25 CENTS AND FOR EXPRESS SCHEDULES 30 CENTS.

THE RATES FOR SENIORS FOR REGULAR SCHEDULES IS
5 CENTS AND 10 CENTS FOR THE EXPRESS RUN DURING THE FOLLOWING
HOURS UPON THE MERE PRESENTATION OF THEIR MEDICARE CARD.

MONDAY THROUGH FRIDAY, 9:30 TO 3:30 P.M. 7:00

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P.M. UNTIL MIDNIGHT ANY NIGHT. ALL DAY SATURDAY, SUNDAY, AND HOLIDAYS.

IT SHOULD BE NOTED THAT THESE REDUCED FARES APPLY
TO ALL FORMS OF TRANSPORTATION; TROLLEY, BUS, AND CABLE CAR.

TRANSFER PRIVILEGES ARE ALLOWED ON ALL REGULARLY SCHEDULED TRANSPORTATION. HOWEVER, WHEN TRANSFERRING FROM A REGULARLY SCHEDULED UNIT TO AN EXPRESS UNIT, THE SENIOR WOULD PAY AN ADDITIONAL 5 CENTS. THIS IS TO MAINTAIN THE EXPRESS RATE OF 10. WHEN BOARDING THE EXPRESS, HE WILL PRESENT HIS MEDICARE CARD.

NOW RECENTLY, THE BAY AREA RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT,
BETTER KNOWN AS BART TO YOU GENTLEMEN WHO ARE ACQUAINTED WITH
THE RELATIONSHIP OF INITIALS, RECENTLY ANNOUNCED A 75 PERCENT
REDUCTION IN FARE FOR SENIORS FOLLOWING NEGOTIATIONS WITH
THE BAY AREA SENIOR CITIZENS COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION. THIS
IS TO COVER THE NEW 75-MILE ROUTE VIA THE RECENTLY DEVELOPED
RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT.

NEW YORK CITY: THE REGULAR FARES ON SURFACE LINES ARE 30 CENTS, SENIOR FARES ARE 15. MONDAY THROUGH FRIDAY, 10:00 A.M. TO 4:00 P.M.

7:00 P.M. UNTIL MIDNIGHT AND SATURDAY AND SUNDAY.
THE REGULAR FARE ON THE SUBWAY IS 30 CENTS. NOW THE SENIOR
ALSO PAYS 30 CENTS, BUT IN RETURN FOR THAT, HIS TICKET INCLUDES
A ROUND-TRIP PASS DURING THE SAME HOURS.

DETROIT: THE REGULAR FARE 40 CENTS. SENIOR

CITIZENS' FARE 15 CENTS, 9:00 A.M. TO 4:00 P.M. SENIOR CITI
ZENS' TRANSFERS 5 CENTS.

I THINK THE FOREGOING CLEARLY ESTABLISHES THE

NEED FOR A TOTAL REEVALUATION OF RTD'S PRESENT POLICY ON SENIOR

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27 28 JULY 1972, AT WHICH TIME A 5-CENT SALES TAX WILL BE APPLIED TO ALL PURCHASES OF GASOLINE IN THIS STATE. THIS BILL WAS ENACTED FOR THE ALLEGED PURPOSE, AND I'D LIKE TO UNDERSCORE THE WORD "ALLEGE", OF FINANCING A RAPID TRANSIT SYSTEM FOR THIS STATE EXCLUDING ONLY THE JURISDICTION OF THE BAY AREA RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT. AND IT HAS BEEN ESTIMATED, ACCORDING TO RECENT PRESS, THAT THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY WILL RECEIVE SOME 35 MILLION DOLLARS ANNUALLY FROM THIS TAX. NOW, IF THAT BE THE CASE, THE LOGICAL INQUIRY WOULD BE, WILL ALL OF THIS MONEY BE USED FOR THE FINANCING OF A MASS TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM? WILL ADDITIONAL FINANCING BE NECESSARY FOR SUCH AN UNDERTAKING, AND HOW MUCH MORE WILL BE NECESSARY? BUT REGARDLESS OF THE RESPONSE TO THESE QUESTIONS, THE SENIOR CITIZENS OF THIS AREA HAVE A RIGHT TO EXPECT A BETTER BREAK ON TRANSIT FARES. CONSIDERING THE FACT THAT THE REDUCTION OF FARES ENCOURAGES THE USE OF TRANSIT FACILITIES DURING THE HOURS OF LEAST UTILIZATION. THIS IN TURN ACTUALLY ENHANCES THE INCOME OF THE WHOLE SYSTEM.

CITIZENS' FARES. AND I THINK WE OUGHT TO LOOK FORWARD TO

I WOULD RESPECTFULLY DRGE, GENTLEMEN, THAT YOU CONSIDER THE PLIGHT OF THE ELDERLY FALO HAVE TO RELY ON PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AND WHO ARE LIVING ON FIXED, FROZEN INCOME. YOU CANNOT AFFORD TO DO LESS FOR OUR SENIORS THAN SAN FRANCISCO IS DOING FOR THEIRS, OR CAN YOU?

(APPLAUSE)

IF YOU DO - IF YOU DO - AND MONETARY MATTERS ARE
OF A CONSIDERATION, HOPEFULLY, YOUR SHARE OF THE NEW 5-CENT
SALES TAX "BONANZA" WILL PROVIDE A BIT OF A CUSHION AND SOME

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CONSOLATION FOR YOUR EFFORTS. I WOULD LIKE TO SAY, TOO, IN CLOSING, THAT THERE IS A DEFINITE TREND THROUGHOUT AMERICA TO PROVIDE FREE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION. IN OUR OWN BACK YARD THE CITY OF COMMERCE HAS SUCH A SYSTEM. THE CITY OF MINNEAPOLIS RECENTLY ADOPTED IT.

FOR MORE REASONS THAN ONE, NOT ONLY OUT OF
RESPECT FOR THE ELDERLY, BUT AS A MEANS OF REDUCING THE NUMBER
OF AUTOMOBILES IN A HIGHLY CONGESTED, METROPOLITAN, URBAN
CENTER.

WHEN I LISTENED TO THE CAR RADIO THIS MORNING,

I SEE THEY'VE DONE THE SAME THING IN ROME. SO IF YOU GENTLEMEN

WANT TO LIVE BY THE OLD ADAGE OF "DO AS ROME DOES," MAY I

SUGGEST YOU TRY THAT.

THANK YOU.

(LAUGHTER AND APPLAUSE)

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: MR. CARBRAY - MR. CARBRAY -
(CONTINUED APPLAUSE)

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: MR. CARBRAY, I JUST WANTED TO INDICATE
AND YOU MENTIONED IN YOUR REMARKS THE FUNDS THAT ARE BEING MALE
AVAILABLE TO THE DISTRICT UNDER SENATE BILL 325, AND I JUST AN
WONDERING IF YOU ARE AWARE THAT THERE IS AN ATTACK ON THAT
WHICH THE TRANSIT DISTRICT BOARD TOOK ACTION AT LEAST
YESTERDAY AND WENT ON RECORD AS IN OPPOSITION TO IT, BUT THE
PROPOSED WATSON AMENDMENT WOULD, IN EFFECT, ELIMINATE THAT
AND MAKE IT IMPOSSIBLE FOR US, EVEN IF WE ENACTED REDUCED
FARES, TO CONTINUE IT.

SO I THINK THAT ONE OF THE THINGS THAT YOU SHOULD BE AWARE OF IS THE FACT THAT THIS IS A VERY DEFINITE

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THREAT TO OUR ABILITY TO PROVIDE THE KIND OF REDUCED FARES THAT YOU ARE ASKING US FOR.

MR. CARBRAY: MR. CHAIRMAN, I WASN'T AWARE OF YOUR ACTION, BUT I WAS AWARE OF THE THREAT, AND I WOULD SAY THAT YOU HAVE A MULTIPLE PROBLEM, AND THAT'S ABOUT ALL THE CONSOLATION I CAN GIVE YOU ON IT. THANK YOU.

(LAUGHTER AND APPLAUSE)

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: OH, YES, ONE FINAL REQUEST, MR. CARBRAY.

I'VE BEEN ASKED, ANYONE WHO HAS A PREPARED STATEMENT, WOULD YOU

PLEASE LEAVE A COPY WITH THE REPORTER.

MR. LAWRENCE CHRISCO, PRESIDENT, ALLIED SENIOR CITIZENS OF CALIFORNIA.

MR. L/WRENCE E. CHRISCO: MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD --

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: WOULD YOU SPEAK INTO ONE OF THE MICROPHONES.

MR. CHRISCO: I AM NOT A SINGER, MR. CHAIRMAN, SO MY NAME IS NOT CARUSO.

CHAIRMAN NEUSOM: I AM SORRY.

(LAUGHTER)

WOULD YOU PRONOUNCE IT.

MR. CHRISCO: MY NAME IS LARRY CHRISCO, C-H-R-I-S-C-O,
AND I LIVE AT 4302 ALBURY AVENUE IN LAKEWOOD. BESIDES BEING
THE HEAD AT THE PRESENT TIME OF ALLIED SENIOR CITIZENS CLUBS OF
CALIFORNIA, I AM VICE-CHAIRMAN OF THE COUNTY COMMISSION ON
AGING, AND I HAVE BEEN ASKED TO REPRESENT THE MAYOR'S
COMMITTEE, OF WHICH I AM A MEMBER OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
AND CHAIRMAN OF THE TRANSPORTATION OVER THERE.
